When on November 9, 1989 the Berlin Wall came down and Brandenburg Gate was open again, a new chapter in the history of Berlin began. Parliament and Government moved to the German capital, embassies, media, companies, artists, lobby-organizations followed.

The new Berlin can be seen at Potsdamer Platz, where a totally new quarter was built. The Reichstag was restored, there are new buildings for the political institutions, and the area around Brandenburg Gate was reconstructed. The new main train station was opened in spring 2006. The town is still full of construction sites. There is much dynamic and innovation but growing together of the east and west part of the city in a changed Europe is also a difficult process under difficult financial and economic conditions.

City of multitude

3.4 million people live in Berlin; 50% in single-person households. Berlin is well known for its multitude of cultures, religions and life styles. People from more than 150 nations are living here, among them the largest Turkish community outside Turkey. Each year in spring the “Carnival of Cultures” where people from many nations show their traditions singing and dancing, attracts more than 500,000 people. A walk through the 12 districts gives the best impression of this multicultural city.

City of culture

Opera or avant-garde performance, antique sculpture or surrealist painting, tradition or innovation – Berlin has it all. At “Kulturforum” you can see masterworks of renaissance painting at the Picture Gallery and then walk over to enjoy great music at the unique concert hall “Philharmonie” of Berlin Philharmonic Orchestra. You have the choice between three opera houses. From the Staatsoper Unter den Linden it is a short walk to Museum Island (World Culture Heritage of UNESCO) where the Old Museum with Nefertiti, and the treasures of the Old National Gallery can be seen. The Jewish Museum in Kreuzberg gives an excellent impression of more than 2,000 years of Jewish life. The history of airplanes, ships and computers comes alive at the Museum of Technology. Several places of memorial sites remind of the dark sides of German history.

In the districts Mitte, Prenzlauer Berg and Kreuzberg the young, innovative scene can be found in artist’s studios, galleries. Further more: you will find a huge number of clubs, bars, and restaurants. There is no closing time.

When tired of the city you can take a trip on a boat, enjoy the parks, or visit Charlottenburg castle or Sanssouci castle in Potsdam or discover the beautiful landscapes of Brandenburg.

City of science

Four universities are situated in Berlin: Humboldt University, Freie Universität Berlin, Technical University, University of the Arts, with more than 140,000 students. At “Charité” with its great tradition, the medical research of the universities is concentrated. Besides the universities there are many other research institutes and two technology parks.

Tourist information

Climate and clothing

In autumn the weather in Berlin can be quite cold (around 14 degree Celsius on average) and rainy. Please take this into account when choosing your clothes. We suggest you to bring warm clothes and a raincoat.

Currency, banking and exchange facilities

In Germany the EURO is the official currency. Besides many exchange offices, which are often located close to railway-stations and airports, banks can be found all over the city. Opening-hours are consumer friendly, many banks are open until the evening on several days. Outside the opening-hours, many cash dispensers are ready to serve you. You either need an EC card or a credit card.

Current credit cards are accepted in most of the hotels, restaurants and shops.

Electricity

Electric sockets in Germany carry 220 V and conform to the standard continental type. Travel adaptors may be useful for electric appliances with other standards.

Insurances

We would like to recommend travel insurance for cancellation charges and loss of personal baggage to all participants/delegates.

Health insurance is just as important to cover medical expenses in case of emergency/illness.

Medical treatment

Citizens of the EU need a special form to cover medical treatment. Addresses of doctors and specialists can be found in the "Yellow Pages". In case of sudden illness at night or on Sundays, there is an emergency service.

Post office

The nearest post office is at Grenzallee 4–6, about a 10 min walk away from the Estrel Hotel.

The opening hours are Monday to Friday from 9:00 am to 6:00 pm and Saturday from 9:00 am to 2:00 pm (as at July 2008).

Tax

The Federal Republic of Germany raises a value added tax (VAT) of 19% (reduced 7%) on all products and services, which is already included in the price.

Tax-Free

If you buy non-edible goods in Berlin you are entitled to a VAT-refund unless you are citizen of another EU-country. If you enter a shop with a Tax-Free sign outside, ask for a special form. This form must be stamped when you get through customs – but be prepared to show your goods, which must still be in their original packing.

The tax is refunded either at the border or sent to the address on the envelope containing the cheque.

Telephone

Public phone booths stand on every street corner. There are different types of public phone booths. The older ones are coin-operated with 20ct as minimum to make a call. The most public booths require a telephone card, which are sold at post-offices, press-shops as well as in the Tourist Info Centers. International phone calls can be made from all public telephones.

Time

Berlin is in the Central-European time zone, which means one hour ahead of Greenwich Mean Time. Additionally, Berlin has a summer time (MESZ), meaning that during spring and summer (from March to October 2009) the clocks are put forward one hour.

How to get to the congress venue

By train

From station Berlin-Hauptbahnhof

When arriving at Berlin-Hauptbahnhof please take the Bus M41 (direction "Sonnenallee/Baumschulenstraße") and disembark at station "Ziegrastraße". From there it takes a little walk of 5 min to the Estrel hotel (total journey time: approx. 45 min).

From Station Berlin-Ostbahnhof

When arriving at Berlin-Ostbahnhof please take the S-Bahn (any line) heading east to station "Ostkreuz" and switch to the S41 until you

reach "Sonnenallee". From there it takes a little walk of 5 min to the Estrel hotel (total journey time: approx. 25 min).

By plane

From Airport Berlin Schönefeld

When arriving at the airport Berlin-Schönefeld please take the bus (direction "U Herrmannplatz") to the station "S Sonnenallee". From there it takes a little walk of 5 min to the Estrel hotel (total journey time: approx. 50 min).

From Airport Berlin Tegel

When arriving at the airport Berlin-Tegel please take the express bus X9 (direction "S and U Zoologischer Garten") until you reach the station "S and U Jungfernheide". Then change into the circle line S42 and drop off at "S Sonnenallee". From there it takes a little walk of 5 min to the Estrel hotel (total journey time: approx. 50 min).

By car

Motorway 114 – from Prenzlau

- Follow B109 Prenzlauer Promenade in direction city center/ Alexanderplatz
- From there follow direction to Kottbusser Tor until you have reached Sonnenallee 225

Motorway 115 – from Hannover/Leipzig

- Motorway intersection Funkturm, take A100 towards direction Wilmersdorf
- After 14 km on the A 100 turn right into Grenzallee until you have reached Sonnenallee 225

Motorway 111 – from Hamburg/Rostock

- A 111 (E 26) from direction Hamburg/Rostock
- Motorway intersection Oranienburg, follow A111 in direction of Berlin-Zentrum/Airport Berlin-Tegel
- Take exit Berlin-Zentrum/Berlin-Reinickendorf and follow the A100 until you reach Grenzallee/Sonnenallee

Environmental zone: ESTREL Hotel and Convention Center is located close to an environmental zone. Therefore we recommend to purchase an appropriate windscreen sticker. The stickers are issued by the vehicle registration authority and by exhaust gas test organizations



such as TÜV and DEKRA. Specific traffic signs have been mounted on the roads clearly showing where the environmental zone begins.

Please be aware, that driving a vehicle inside the environmental zone without the appropriate sticker is an official offence.
